References to things, events, happenings, topics, etc Include here references to past events (such as previous property transfers) Widow Anne Rayner and her son, James, paid £11 to widow Mabel Wigglesworth, and her son Robert, for the 2,860 year lease on Dooracrook, a field in Kilnsey.

The location of this field is clearly defined by its relationship to surrounding features:

- 1. On the north & NE a quick hedge boundary with Byrom Close (belonging to Anne Rayner)
- 2. On the S & SE adjoins River Wharfe
- 3. On the W & NW a boundary of mere stones to Jean Jackson's land (half-acre)

An annual peppercorn rent could be demanded each 1st January.

Over the next 7 years Mabel and Robert Wigglesworth were entitled to demand that the Rayners produce legal proof of their right to sell this property to them.

Queries & Local Issues to note

Anything which should go into the project Timeline as of specific interest to Kilnsey's local history or which raises questions about local affairs⁴ Anne Rayner appears to be expanding her holdings by buying up the neighbouring field.

Note how both widows are acting with the support of their sons, but it may be assumed that the 2 women were the driving forces behind the transaction.

There is, coincidentally, a 3rd widow mentioned as a landowner in Kilnsey.
